Text 10

In English-speaking countries, when you receive an invitation you should

answer it immediately, saying whether you are able to accept it or not. If the invitation is given by word of mouth, you should answer at once whether you can come or not. If you can not give an answer at that time, you may say, "May I let you know this evening?" Or some such words.

When you are invited to lunch, dinner or supper, it is very impolite to arrive late. When you arrive, the hostess or some members of the family will probably meet you at the door and take your coat and hat. In a few minutes the hostess will ask her guests to come in to dinner. She may or may not ask each gentleman to take a lady in. If she does, the lady will take the gentleman's arm as they walk into the dining room. If she does not, the ladies will go in first, followed by the gentlemen. The hostess will either point out their seats to the guests as they come in or have a place card at each place with the guests' name on it.

After the meal is over it is not polite to leave for at least half an hour, lest you seem to have come only for the meal. An evening dinner invitation usually implies that you stay for the whole evening. The hostess often plans some after-dinner entertainment.
