Text 10

Zao Wou-ki, a painter who was the highest-selling Chinese artist, died on Tuesday at his home in Switzerland and the age of 93.

Mr. Zao, who is known for his special works, suffered from a serious disease and weak health. He was living in a lakeside house with his third wife, who survives him along with a son from a previous marriage.

Born in Beijing, in 1920, Mr. Zao studied fine arts in Hangzhou and Chongqing before moving to Paris in 1948. In France, he began to discover Western art styles and became a key figure in art in the second half of the 20th century. However, his career was at its lowest point in the 1990s, when few of his works were sold and museum interest decreased.

The artist's career took off again following a major art show in Paris in 2003. Since then, his mix of Chinese techniques with Western art style has caught the eye of wealthy Asian collectors—especially from Taiwan and mainland China.

In 2011, Mr. Zao was the top-selling, living Chinese artist, with his works selling for \$90 million in total that year. Demand remains strong. Last week, one of his paintings sold for \$4.8 million at a sale in Hong Kong.

Zao Wou-ki, the Chinese French artist internationally recognized to be an art master, won a lot of honors and respect all his life.
